Phonics


In Reception, the children have worked hard on their phonics. They have completed phases 2, 3 and 4 and are ready to start phase 5 in September.


The government introduced a national phonic test for all year one pupils in 2012. This takes place during the June of your child being in Year 1. (Please do not book any holidays at this time).

Bookbags

As your child enters Year One, the children will be encouraged to work with growing independence. To support this, your child will be taking responsibility for their own book bag. In due course, your child will be expected to remove books and any letters, slips, homework and monies from their book bags. They should also make the teacher aware if a message has been written in their Home/School diary. The children are supported through this process with clear verbal instructions being given. It would be much appreciated if you could support your child with this, reminding them in the morning to remove key items such as homework. The children should bring their book bags into school every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. You may also use the front of your child's diary to record any messages for us to read. We may also use them to record messages for you,

so please check these regularly.

Reading Books


There will be opportunities for the children to take a book home three times a week.







Homework may be used to support other areas of the curriculum, particularly in the lead up to the phonic screening check in the summer term.




Spellings will be given out each week and tested as a whole class every Monday.


Please ensure that your child has their spelling book in their book bag in preparation for this session.








Year 1 Maths Activity Mat: Autumn 1

Procedure and dates

All children will come straight to their new classroom door in September.

Start of the day: 8:50am End of the day: 3:15pm

Classroom doors will open at 8:45am

The children will be provided with free fruit or a vegetable snack daily.

A lunch menu will be posted on the website (Parents-Menu) in September if you would like to talk to your child about their daily choices. Milk can be purchased and is paid for termly through the school office.

How you can help

- Support your child in 'sounding out' unfamiliar words and spelling common words from the word lists correctly.
- Write shopping lists/letters to a friend.
- Write a message to their new teacher at school on Google Classroom.
- Enjoy story books and audio books together.
- Practise naming and sounding letters of the alphabet.
- Play simple number games (snakes and ladders etc)
- Practise balancing, running, skipping, jumping, throwing and catching.
- Encourage your child to listen carefully and carry out a range of simple instructions.
- Ask your child to explain their games/pictures etc to you.
- Practise counting objects reliably. Look at counting in twos through sorting out pairs of socks etc.
- Encourage your child to solve simple addition and subtraction problems.
- Continue to recap on digraphs (2 letters that together make 1 sound) e.g. ee, sh, th.



How you can help – Reading and writing

The children have come so far with their reading and frequent sharing/reading of books will help to sustain their progress throughout the Summer holidays.

- Talk to your child about everything they see around them. There is so much to learn and the more they know, the easier it will be for them to understand what they read about in books.
- Set aside some time every day when you and your child read together for pleasure. This will teach them so many skills! They will learn how to handle and enjoy books.

 Developing a love of books will help your child to develop positive attitudes to reading.
- Making sure they exercise as this is very good for their learning. Exercise is good for our brains as well as our bodies and children will also develop strength and coordination.
 This will help their writing as their arms and hands will be stronger.
- Little hands also need practise to become able to use fine motor skills. As with
 most skills, practise is what matters, so encourage your children to play with jigsaw
 puzzles, playdough, threading toys, colouring books or any other activity where
 they have to use their hands. This will make it so much easier for them to write
 neatly and well when they are taught at school.
